State of the Judiciary Report 2012 State of the Judiciary Message



My colleagues; judges of the General District Courts and Juvenile and Domestic Relations District Courts; members of the General Assembly; staff from the Office of the Executive Secretary, the Clerk's Office, the Chief Staff Attorney's Office, and the State Law Library; and guests, I am pleased to talk with you today about the state of the Judiciary in the Commonwealth. I speak on behalf of all Judicial Branch employees. Our 4,500 Judicial Branch employees handle over four million proceedings annually and provide services each day to the citizens of the Commonwealth in their encounters with the Judicial Branch of government as civil litigants, defendants, victims, witnesses, and jurors. Despite increasing caseloads and fewer resources, Judicial Branch employees continue to strive to effectively serve Virginia's citizens. I thank all the employees - judges, clerks and support staff - for their fortitude and commitment to the administration of justice in the Commonwealth.

Since our conference last year, the Judicial Branch has been engaged in a number of activities, has made significant accomplishments, and has reached several milestones. I wish to report on some of them, including the budget, the Weighted Caseload Study, Rules of Evidence, technology and training, and significant anniversaries.

First, with regard to the Judiciary's budget, the General Assembly appropriated funds to fill 34 judicial vacancies, which includes the 11 funded-but-unfilled vacancies from last year. All those funded vacancies have been filled except for two circuit court and one juvenile and domestic relations district court positions. The General Assembly also appropriated funds for 61 new district court clerk positions and ten new foreign language interpreter positions, both starting in the first year of the biennium. The new district court clerk positions will enable us to bring the staffing level in all of our district courts to at least 80% of the model staffing guidelines and will significantly reduce the staffing shortages in many district court clerks' offices. Unfortunately, reducing the staffing shortages does not address the disparity between

the average compensation for a district court clerk's office employee and the average salary of other employees of the Commonwealth. The average salary of a deputy district court clerk is \$30,432, while the average salary of an employee of the Commonwealth, excluding university personnel, is \$43,800. The Judiciary graciously thanks the General Assembly for appropriating funds for judicial vacancies and these needed positions, and for its support on many other issues that affect the Judiciary.

As a follow-up to last year's Judicial Boundary Realignment Study, the 2012 General Assembly passed legislation requiring the Supreme Court to develop and implement a weighted caseload system to assess judicial caseloads throughout the Commonwealth. To comply with this legislation and to develop the weighted caseload system, the Supreme Court has contracted with the National Center for State Courts, which is a recognized leader in this area and has conducted multiple judicial and workload assessment studies throughout the country in recent years. This assessment will

consider not just the number of cases filed but will address other factors such as the complexity of various case types so that we can more accurately measure the judicial workload in our courts.

Starting this spring and continuing into 2013, the National Center for State Courts will work with members of the Judicial Branch to gather and analyze information, and develop the weighted caseload system. That system will provide a means to: (1) determine the need for judges; (2) assess the equitable distribution of judges throughout the Commonwealth; (3) address the issue of judicial boundary realignment; and (4) link judicial resource levels with measurable performance indicators (e.g., time to disposition, clearance rate). Staff of the Office of the Executive Secretary will assist the National Center for State Courts in developing this system. All judges will be asked to provide input and complete surveys related to their average business day and the amount of time they generally spend on different types of cases. The time studies will be conducted this fall. I stress to you the importance that all judges timely provide the requested data. It is vital to the completion of this weighted caseload assessment. The Court is required to report the findings to the General Assembly by November 15, 2013.

I recognize and thank everyone who served on the Judicial Boundary Realignment Study Committee and each of you as judges for responding to the initial request for information. Your response rate of 95% was quite impressive. The thoroughness of that committee's work highlighted the need for the weighted caseload study.

As you know, the date of "July 1" is a significant date in the Commonwealth. That is generally the "effective date" of new laws, new court forms, and a new budget. Due to the efforts of countless individuals over the course of many years, I am pleased to report that Virginia now has codified Rules of Evidence as of July 1, 2012. The chief patron of House Bill 101 was Delegate G. Manoli Loupassi, with Delegates David B. Albo, Gregory D. Habeeb, and Betsy B. Carr serving as co-patrons. Senator John S. Edwards was the chief patron of Senate Bill 94. On behalf of the Judiciary, we thank them for their leadership, along with other members of the General Assembly, in shepherding these bills to passage. Through years of careful drafting and editing by individuals of the Boyd-Graves Conference and various bar associations, as well as numerous other individuals, the Rules of Evidence bring together in one, organized document existing common law and statutory evidentiary rules that are drafted in neutral language. We thank the bar associations in the Commonwealth that supported adoption of the Rules of Evidence. Special thanks, however, must be extended to the Virginia Bar Association and to the Virginia Trial Lawyers Association. The leadership of those two organizations provided invaluable work in highlighting the need for the Rules and in supporting their passage by the General Assembly.

In 2012, the State Justice Institute awarded the Judiciary a Technical Assistance Grant, which provided funding for a new Judicial Mentoring Program. Justice Millette chairs this program, which introduces new judges to the Judicial Branch, its values, purpose, and mission. Mentor judges are assigned to a new judge within 48 hours of the Office of the Executive Secretary receiving notice of the new judge's appointment. The mentor judges then provide an immediate source of guidance and support for new judges. The formal duration of the relationship is one year. The Mentoring Program will be incorporated into the current educational program for new judges as part of the mandatory Pre-Bench Orientation Program. To date, 52 judges have been trained as mentors – 18 circuit court judges, 17 general district court judges, and 17 juvenile and domestic relations district court judges. This Mentoring Program will strengthen the already impressive training offered to new judges in the Commonwealth. Along with Justice Millette, Caroline Kirkpatrick, the Director of Educational Services, has been instrumental in implementing the program, and the Judiciary thanks both of them.

This past fall, a revamped Orientation and

Judicial Management Program for New District Court Clerks was introduced. The 18-month program includes a four-day training session at the Office of the Executive Secretary; online courses through Michigan State University's Judicial Administration Program; and online courses in the Virginia Judicial System Knowledge Center. This program serves several important functions: (1) it helps the new clerks build internal and external relationships; (2) it communicates the Judicial Branch's vision, goals, culture and values; (3) it ensures that new clerks understand key business processes, policies and procedures; (4) it reduces the time it takes newly hired clerks to reach productivity; (5) it offers an opportunity to build leadership and management skills; (6) and finally, it provides educational opportunities specific to the field of court administration. This essential program was developed through the collaborative effort of the Departments of Human Resources, Judicial Services, and Educational Services of the Office of the Executive Secretary.

The Judiciary has also made significant strides in technology advancement. Our online pre-court and post-court payment for general district courts accounts for approximately \$6.2 million each month and represents over 30% of the general district courts' total collections. While work continues to develop our electronic filing system, our legacy case management system has been replaced with a JAVA browser-based system which has now been implemented in the 117 circuit courts using our case management system and in all juvenile and domestic relations district courts. The new case management system for general district courts is in the design phase, and we anticipate deployment in a pilot court in 2013.

In other technology developments, the Case Imaging System, the system that allows scanning and retrieval of case papers, has been installed in 51 circuit courts. Judicial Search, which allows electronic access to all scanned case files and court orders in chambers and on the bench, has been installed in five new courts this year, bringing the total to 15. Sixty-two circuit courts have received a web interface that automatically allows electronic access to court orders scanned into Case Imaging, eliminating the need for clerks in those courts to fax orders to the Department of Corrections. In order to enhance our faculty development and enable individuals to effectively serve as faculty in the court system, the Judiciary has implemented a three-day program that provides its employees with the skills necessary to successfully design and deliver judicial training programs. Eighteen individuals attended the "Faculty Development Program for District Court Clerks and Magistrates" in March 2012.

In December 2012, we mourned the passing of Richard Paul Kern, the Director of the Virginia Criminal Sentencing Commission. He served in that capacity from 1993 until his death. Dr. Kern was dedicated to the criminal justice system and left his invaluable stamp on the sentencing guidelines established by the Virginia Criminal Sentencing Commission.

This year will mark the tenth anniversary of the Best Practices Court Program in Virginia's juvenile and domestic relations district courts. After ten years of numerous local and state activities including the transformation of Virginia's children services system, there are 37 active court teams that have contributed to a 32% statewide decrease in the total number of children in foster care over the past six years.

In 2012, we will recognize and celebrate the 60th anniversary of the establishment of the Office of the Executive Secretary of the Supreme Court of Virginia. As with the creation of state court administrative offices in other states, the establishment of the Office of the Executive Secretary marked a commitment by the Judiciary's leaders to the reform and modernization of judicial administration within Virginia's court system. As envisioned by my predecessor, Chief Justice Edward Wren Hudgins, when addressing the 1950 Judicial Conference of Virginia, the Executive Secretary would not only assume the daily administrative responsibilities essential to the efficient functioning of all the courts, but also act as a liaison between the Judiciary and the other two branches of government. In doing so, the Executive Secretary would be able to efficiently inform the public of the importance of the work of the Judicial Branch so that "the people of Virginia will hold the courts in higher esteem and have more confidence in them." The multitude of services provided by the Office of the Executive Secretary to operate a large, modern organization are well known to everyone working in the Judicial Branch but are mostly hidden from the view of the public, especially as compared to the work of the courts and the judges themselves. It is appropriate that we recognize the foresight of those who created the Office of the Executive Secretary and the contributions it makes to the successful operation and maintenance of Virginia's courts. Please join me in recognizing and thanking all those who work and have worked in the Office of the Executive Secretary of the Supreme Court of Virginia.

During the Supreme Court's January session, we recognized the 100th Anniversary of the Virginia Board of Bar Examiners. Actually, it was the Board's 102nd anniversary. Although Virginia has required attorneys to be licensed since 1643, the General Assembly created the Board of Bar Examiners in 1910 and charged the five-member board with examining "the legal learning and general qualifications" of prospective attorneys. Since its creation, the Virginia Board of Bar Examiners has administered two bar exams each year to a total of approximately 83,000 people. The dedication of the Board members and staff and the immense amount of work they perform ensures that when citizens of the Commonwealth seek legal representation, they have quality representation.

In April of this year, the Supreme Court convened a Pro Bono Summit at the request of the Virginia Bar Association. This was the second such summit, the first one having been convened in 2010. The purpose of the summit was to recognize the continuing need for and the appreciation of pro bono legal services in the Commonwealth. During the summit, an executive director of one of the regional legal aid offices expressed the need for the judiciary to communicate to local bar associations the judiciary's expectations that lawyers provide pro bono legal services. I agree with that speaker's observations, and I thus ask you as judges to convey to the members of your local bar through bench bar conferences or by other means your expectations that attorneys answer the call for more pro bono legal services in these difficult economic times. Let them know that with the privilege of being attorneys comes the noble calling and responsibility to provide their skills to those in need.

And, as judges and judicial employees, let us not forget our noble responsibility as the third branch of government, a separate and independent branch that is unlike the other branches. The Judicial Branch does not pass laws, and the Judicial Branch does not approve or veto legislation. Instead, the Judicial Branch applies the laws as passed pursuant to our Constitution and the Constitution of the United States. In the words of the Chief Justice of Nevada, Michael L. Douglas, "The Judicial Branch the Courts - has but one true allegiance - that is to the Constitution and the rule of law."

When I addressed you last year, I reminded you that as judges, we set the example of professionalism and we must set the example high. I again remind all of us of the duty to act professionally in everything that we do.

To stress the importance of this responsibility, I leave with you this thought by Arthur T. Vanderbilt, who served as the Chief Justice of the New Jersey Supreme Court from 1948 to 1957:

If citizens have respect for the work of the courts, their respect for law will survive the shortcomings of every other branch of government; but if they lose their respect for the work of the courts, their respect for law and order will vanish with it.

Thank you, and may God bless the Commonwealth and its judiciary.

SUPREME COURT OF VIRGINIA

Jurisdiction and Structure

The Supreme Court of Virginia, which sits in Richmond and is composed of seven Justices, concluded its two hundred and thirty-third year of operation in 2012. The Chief Justice of the Supreme Court is elected by a majority of the Court's Justices and serves a four-year term. The Court meets for five-day sessions beginning in September of each year and every seventh week until completion of the June docket. There are no formal sessions of court during July and August.

The Court's original jurisdiction may be invoked by way of petition for habeas corpus, mandamus, or prohibition. Appellate jurisdiction is invoked by appeal or writ of error attacking the judgment of a trial court. The Court hears appeals from the circuit courts involving civil cases (excluding domestic relations cases), criminal cases in which a sentence of death has been imposed, habeas appeals, and appeals from the State Corporation Commission.

Additionally, the Supreme Court is empowered to deal with matters concerning judicial censure, retirement, and removal. Subject to some statutory limitations, cases decided by the Court of Appeals may be appealed to the Supreme Court. The Supreme Court may, on its own motion or that of the Court of Appeals, certify a case originally appealed to the Court of Appeals for review by the Supreme Court before it has been determined by the Court of Appeals.

During the recess periods between sessions of the Court, the Justices conduct extensive legal research upon cases awaiting decision, draft and review opinions, study cases in which petitions for appeal have been filed, conduct hearings on petitions for appeal, and attend to administrative duties.

In addition to its appellate functions of examining results reached in lower courts and of redefining and developing the body of state law, the Supreme Court is also authorized to adopt rules of practice and procedure and to oversee changes in the organization of lower courts. The Supreme Court is responsible for the general supervision of the entire Virginia Judicial System.

Review of 2012 Caseload Activity

In 2012, the number of filings in the Supreme Court of Virginia totaled 2,216, which was 117 cases less than recorded in 2011. In 2012, criminal cases decreased by 104 petitions or 9.3%. There was no change in the number of civil filings in 2012 remaining at 600 filings. See Table 1-Part Two. There were 31 petitions withdrawn before being acted upon in 2011. A total of 270 petitions for rehearing were filed with the Court during the year, down from 427 the previous year. A total of 413 of such petitions were decided: 432 refused, 1 withdrawn, and 11 granted. The Court qualified 414 local attorneys and 103 corporate attorneys and licensed and qualified 42 foreign attorneys in 2012. In addition, 24 attorneys were appointed to represent indigents. See Table 1 - Part One.

During the year, 123 petitions for appeal were granted, the majority of which (89 or 72.4%) were civil in nature. Also among those petitions granted were 17 criminal petitions. The Court refused 1,598 petitions for appeal in 2012, including 999 criminal petitions refused from the Court of Appeals (62.5% of the total refused) and 488 civil petitions (30.5% of the total refused). The total number of appeals granted and/or refused decreased 15.0% in 2012 to 1,721 a decrease of 303 cases from 2011. See Table 2.

Of the original jurisdiction petitions, the Court awarded 15 in 2012, down from 27 the year before. The Court refused 374 original jurisdiction petitions during the year, 284 or 75.9% of which were matters involving habeas corpus. There were also 81 writs of mandamus refused. The total number of original jurisdiction petitions docketed, awarded, and refused was 392, a decline of 9.7% from 434 in 2011. The total number of cases acted on decreased in 2012, from 2,458 to 2,113. See Table 2.

There were 119 cases decided by opinion in 2012 while another 69 cases were decided by orders. In 62 or 52.1% of the cases decided by opinion, the judgment of the lower court was affirmed. The number of opinions in which judgments were reversed or remanded in 2012 totaled 50 or 42.0% of the cases decided by opinion.

COURT OF APPEALS

Jurisdiction of the Court

The Court of Appeals of Virginia was established in 1985 and is composed of 11 judges who sit in panels of three in various regions of the state. The Chief Judge of the Court of Appeals is elected by a majority of the Court's judges and serves a four-year term.

The Court of Appeals sits in various regional locations in order to provide convenient access to Virginia's citizens. These locations are normally in Alexandria, Norfolk, Richmond, and Salem. The clerk of the Court of Appeals is headquartered in Richmond and receives, processes, and maintains permanent records of appeals and other official documents filed with the Court.

The Court of Appeals hears appeals from circuit courts in all criminal matters except death penalty cases and in all domestic relations matters. In addition, appeals from decisions of the Virginia Workers' Compensation Commission and from most administrative agencies are taken to the Court. The Court also has original jurisdiction to issue writs of mandamus, prohibition, and habeas corpus in any case over which the Court would have appellate jurisdiction. The Court has authority to hear appeals as a matter of right from:

- any final judgment, order, or decree of a circuit court involving affirmance or annulment of a marriage, divorce, custody, spousal or child support, or control or disposition of a child, as well as other domestic relations cases;
 - any final decision of the Virginia Workers' Compensation Commission (a state agency responsible for handling workers' compensation claims);
 - any final decision of a circuit court on appeal from a decision of an administrative agency (example: the Department of Health); and
 - any interlocutory order granting, dissolving, or denying an injunction or adjudicating the principles of a cause in any of the cases listed above.

The Court of Appeals also has authority to consider petitions for appeal from:

- final orders of conviction in criminal and traffic matters except where a death penalty is imposed;
- final decisions of a circuit court on an application for a concealed weapons permit; and
- certain preliminary rulings in felony cases when requested by the Commonwealth.

Review of 2012 Caseload Activity

In 2012, the Court of Appeals recorded 2,356 case filings, 259 less than the 2,615 in 2011. This decrease in filings was due to a decrease in criminal petitions by 9.3% and a decrease in appeals of right by 12.6%. See Table 5 and 6.

The majority of filings in 2012 (74.3%) consisted of 1,751 criminal petitions (not including contempt). This was 180 less than the number reported the previous year. The number of petitions involving the Workers' Compensation Commission totaled 122, and there were 268 domestic relations petitions filed during the year. This number of domestic relations appeals was 11 (or 3.9%) more than in 2011.

Final dispositions totaled 2,486 in 2012, 200 less than the year before. This decrease in dispositions was due to a decrease of 60 in non-criminal dispositions and a decrease of 151 in criminal dispositions compared to the decrease in criminal dispositions in 2011 of 210. Criminal dispositions totaled 1,869, and non-criminal dispositions stood at 606. Of the total dispositions in 2012, 75.5% were criminal in nature.

In disposing of the appeals coming before it, the Court in 2012 issued 121 published opinions and 284 unpublished opinions. There were 369 appeals disposed of through orders. The number of published opinions represented an increase of 37.5% from what was reported the previous year, while the number of unpublished opinions represented a decrease of 43 or 13.1%.

During the year, there were 1,092 cases appealed to the Supreme Court of Virginia from the Court of Appeals, 98 less than in 2011. See Table 5.

Of the 1,878 criminal petitions disposed, 210 or 11.2% were granted. This compares with 8.8% of criminal petitions granted in 2011. See Tables 6 and 7. There were 24 pre-trial petitions filed by the Commonwealth and 39 original jurisdiction petitions filed during the year. The original jurisdiction petitions filed consisted of 6 habeas corpus petitions, 9 writs of mandamus or prohibition, and 21 writs of actual innocence. There were 33 original jurisdiction petitions disposed of in 2012.

Appeals of right totaled 540 for the year and included, as mentioned above, 122 appeals from the Workers' Compensation Commission and 268 domestic relations appeals. There were also 33 administrative agency appeals, as well as 113 appeals over which the Court did not have jurisdiction and were candidates for transfer to the Supreme Court. In addition, there were 4 appeals filed during the year regarding concealed weapon permit applications or civil contempt. See Table 6.

Of the 405 appeals decided by opinion, 324 (80.0%) were affirmed, 57 (14.1%) were reversed, 16 (4.0%) were affirmed in part, reversed in part, and 7 (1.7%) were dismissed. There were 369 appeals decided by order in 2012 compared to 391 the previous year. Of these, 191 (51.8%) were dismissed, 75 (20.3%) were withdrawn or settled, 5 (1.4%) were reversed, and 18 (4.9%) cases were affirmed. In addition, 80 (21.7%) were modified, transferred, voided, or certified by the court. See Table 7.

CIRCUIT COURT

Jurisdiction and Structure

The Circuit Courts are Virginia's trial courts of general jurisdiction and have the authority to try a full range of civil and criminal cases. The circuit court system consists of 31 judicial circuits encompassing 120 separate circuit courts in the various counties and cities of the state. The judges of the Circuit Courts are elected and receive interim appointments in the same manner as the Court of Appeals judges. The Chief Judge of the circuit is elected for a two-year term by a vote of the judges serving in the circuit. See Table 20. During 2010 and 2011, the number of judges used to determine caseload per judge coincided with the number of funded judges at the time of the Judicial Boundary Realignment Study (JBRS) in order to maintain consistency with caseload reporting during that time frame. As was the practice historically, the authorized number of judgeships pursuit to the Code of Virginia are used for calculations because the JBRS has concluded.

In 2012, there were three courts, Virginia Beach (2nd), Alexandria (18th) and Fairfax (19th), that did not use the Courts Automated Information System -Case Management System (CAIS-CMS). These courts transmitted their own manually- or electronicallytabulated data. Statistical information has been italicized for these courts in the tables in this section.

Voluntary Case Processing Time Guidelines

90% of all felony cases should be adjudicated or otherwise concluded within 120 days from the date of arrest; 98% within 180 days; and 100% within one year. Preliminary hearings for felony cases in district courts should be concluded within 45 days from the date of arrest. 90% of all misdemeanor cases should be adjudicated or otherwise concluded within 60 days from the date of arrest and 100% within 90 days.

GENERAL DISTRICT COURT

Jurisdiction and Structure

In Virginia, the district court system, operational since 1973, is comprised of two distinct courts. A variety of criminal, traffic, and civil cases are heard by the general district courts. In criminal matters, the general district courts hear misdemeanor cases and hold preliminary hearings for felony cases. In civil cases, the general district court has exclusive jurisdiction in suits involving amounts of \$4,500 or less and concurrent jurisdiction with the circuit courts in suits involving amounts up to \$25,000.

Jurisdiction and Structure

Juvenile and domestic relations district courts have jurisdiction over all proceedings involving the custody, visitation, support, control or disposition of a child who is abused, neglected, in need of services, abandoned, truant, a runaway, a delinquent, violates traffic laws, requires commitment for mental illness or consent to medical treatment. These courts also have jurisdiction over the parents, guardians and legal custodians of such children and over other adults involved in foster care proceedings, paternity determinations, domestic violence, offenses against family or household members, and spousal support matters

MAGISTRATE SYSTEM

Function and Structure

In many instances, a citizen's first contact with Virginia's Judicial System comes through the office of the Magistrate. A principal function of the magistrate is to provide an independent, unbiased review of complaints of criminal conduct brought to the office by law enforcement or the general public. Magistrate duties include issuing various types of processes such as arrest warrants, summonses, bonds, search warrants, subpoenas, and certain civil warrants. Magistrates also conduct bail hearings in instances in which an individual is arrested on a warrant charging him or her with a criminal offense. Magistrates provide services on an around-theclock basis, conducting hearings in person or through the use of video-conferencing systems.

The magistrate system for the Commonwealth is divided into eight regions, and each magistrate is authorized to exercise his or her powers throughout the magisterial region for which he or she is appointed. Each region is comprised of between three and five judicial districts. There are magistrate offices located throughout Virginia, including at least one in each of Virginia's 32 judicial districts.

INFORMATION ABOUT VIRGINIA JUDICIAL POLICY MAKING BODIES

The Judicial Council of Virginia is charged with the responsibility for making a continuous study of the organization, rules and methods of procedure and practice of the judicial system of the Commonwealth. It is also responsible for examining the work accomplished and results produced by the system and its individual offices and courts. A report of the proceedings and recommendations of the Council is made to the General Assembly and to the Supreme Court on an annual basis.

The Chief Justice of the Supreme Court is presiding officer for the Council whose membership includes one Court of Appeals judge, six circuit court judges, one general district court judge, one juvenile and domestic relations district court judge, two attorneys qualified to practice in the Supreme Court and the Chairmen of the Committees for Courts of Justice in the Virginia Senate and House of Delegates. Council members are appointed by the Chief Justice and serve for four years or at the pleasure of the Chief Justice.

The Committee on District Courts was created to assist the Chief Justice in the administrative supervision of Virginia's unified court system. Among the statutorily mandated responsibilities of the CDC are recommending new judgeships and certifying the need to fill district court vacancies, authorizing the number of clerks, magistrates and personnel in each district, establishing guidelines and policies for court system personnel and fixing salary classification schedules for district court personnel and magistrates.

Membership of the Committee includes the Chairmen of the Committees for Courts of Justice in the Senate and House of Delegates, two members of each of the Courts of Justice Committees appointed by the respective Chairmen, the Speaker of the House of Delegates, the Majority Leader of the Senate of Virginia, one circuit court judge, two general district court judge and two juvenile and domestic relations district court judge. These judicial members are appointed by the Chief Justice and serve at his pleasure.

The Judicial Conference of Virginia was organized to discuss and to consider means and methods of improving the administration of justice in the Commonwealth. Active members include the Chief Justice and Justices of the Supreme Court, all judges of the Court of Appeals and the circuit courts and all retired Justices and judges of these courts. The Chief Justice serves as President of the Conference. Six circuit court judges, one Court of Appeals judge and one retired judge are elected to serve on the Conference's Executive Committee. The Conference conducts its business through nine standing committees.

The Judicial Conference of Virginia for District Courts is similar to the Judicial Conference for circuit courts in its mission and responsibilities. Membership includes the Chief Justice, who serves as President and all active judges of the general district and juvenile and domestic relations district courts. Seven district court judges are elected to serve on the Executive Committee of the Conference. The Conference has a committee structure similar to the Judicial Conference of Virginia.

The Office of the Executive Secretary (OES) provides administrative assistance and direction to the courts of the Commonwealth and to Virginia's magistrates through its eleven departments and various related programs. The OES includes the office of the Assistant Executive Secretary and Counsel, the Court Improvement Program, Educational Services, Fiscal Services, Historical Commission, Human Resources, Judicial Information Technology, Judicial Planning, Judicial Programs, Judicial Services, Legal Research, and Legislative & Public Relations.

EXECUTIVE SECRETARY

Major activities include:

- 1. Maintaining liaison with, and providing support to, the legislative and executive branches on matters affecting the courts, as well as serving as liaison to the Bar and to the public.
- 2. Providing appropriate coordination, supervision and administrative support for operations and systems within the court and magistrate systems.
- 3. Managing the day-to-day staff operations of the OES.

Responsibilities:

- Serve as the State Court Administrator and administer the Virginia court system at the direction of the Chief Justice of the Supreme Court of Virginia.
- Provide the Chief Justice with current information on all issues and operations.
- Serve as Secretariat and provide staff support for the Judicial Council of Virginia, the Committee on District Courts, and all Judicial Conferences.
- Serve on the Indigent Defense Commission and the Forensic Science Board.
- Maintain liaison with all agencies of state government, the general public, and the Bar.
- Direct analysis, investigations, and evaluations to respond to requests from, and to develop and to make recommendations to, the General Assembly.
- Specify objectives and develop broad content for the courts' and magistrate systems' regular educational programs.
- Provide direction in the preparation of the Comprehensive Judicial Plan and its implementation.
- Provide direction and final approval on project development within the OES and review and monitor the project management system.
- Provide financial management direction, particularly in the areas of securing grant funding and in preparation, evaluation and defense of budget submissions.

The Assistant Executive Secretary & Counsel and his staff support the Executive Secretary, particularly with legal matters involving OES or the judicial branch.

ASSISTANT EXECUTIVE SECRETARY & COUNSEL Major activities include:

- 1. Reviewing and providing advice on legal issues that come before the Executive Secretary and OES.
- 2. Overseeing the implementation of the Supreme Court's Judicial Disqualification Policy, including the designation of active judges and the designation and recall of retired judges throughout the state.
- 3. Overseeing the Administrative Hearing Officer program administered by the Supreme Court, including working with the Educational Services Department on scheduling and planning for the annual training conference and responding to related issues as they arise.

Responsibilities:

- Serving as the Executive Secretary's designee on certain Committees and Boards.
- Providing legal counsel to the Executive Secretary and the Office of the Executive Secretary, including contract review, policy development, and compliance matters.
- Assisting the Director of Legislative & Public Relations and Executive Secretary with the legislative package.
- Assisting the Chief Justice in arranging designations and drafting appropriate orders for the recall or designation of judges, including judges for multijurisdictional grand juries and threejudge panels.
- Maintaining liaison with certain agencies of state government as requested by the Executive Secretary.
- Maintaining the list of attorneys qualified to act as administrative hearing officers in agency proceedings arising under the Administrative Process Act, and designating hearing officers for particular cases as needed.
- Coordinating the assignment of Medical Malpractice Review Panels.

- Working together with others at OES to respond to issues related to the compensation of retired judges sitting pursuant to recall or designation and the role of substitute judges.
- Maintaining the list, approved by the Chief Justice, of retired judges who are qualified to sit by designation or recall.
- Attending judicial conferences and providing administrative assistance and continuing educational services as needed.
- Maintaining the list of attorneys appointed and qualified to serve as special justices, including review of continuing education compliance.
- Working with the Education Department director and others to provide an annual training program for special justices and for hearing officers.

The office of the Court Improvement Program is responsible for court activities relating to children and families and for the qualification of lawyers as guardians *ad litem* for children and for incapacitated adults.



Responsibilities:

- Support all levels of courts in complying with state and federal laws and policies governing permanency planning for dependent children and their families who are before the courts.
- Create a clear statutory framework for the effective resolution of child abuse, neglect, and foster care cases that promotes permanency planning for these children.
- Identify and implement procedures and forms within juvenile courts to govern and guide the processing and disposition of child abuse, neglect, foster care, and termination of parental rights cases.
- Train court and social services personnel and members of the Bar on the law, procedures, court management, and philosophy governing such cases.
- Improve the availability and competency of legal representation for children, parents, and local departments of social services who are before the courts in child abuse, neglect, and foster care cases.
- Improve the court's management information systems to track more effectively child abuse, neglect, and foster care cases.
- Evaluate the progress sought by the Court Improvement Program in the handling of child maltreatment cases.
- Undertake such other special projects as promote the improvement of this litigation in the juvenile and

domestic relations district courts and circuit courts of the Commonwealth.

- Maintain lists of qualified guardians ad litem for children appointed in juvenile courts and circuit courts and provide monthly updates for posting on the court's Internet and Intranet websites.
- Provide training for guardians ad litem for children for initial qualification and for compliance with ongoing continuing education requirements.
- Maintain lists of qualified guardians ad litem for incapacitated adults appointed in circuit courts and provide monthly updates for posting on the court's Internet and Intranet website.
- Respond to legislative studies directed to the court system on children and family issues.
- Represent the court system on executive branch collaborative groups focused upon the delivery and improvement of services to at-risk families and children.
- Support special activities of juvenile and domestic relations district courts that require central staff support.

The **Educational Services Department's** mission is to provide the Virginia judiciary learning opportunities for continued personal and professional growth. The department provides information and continuing education opportunities for judges, clerks, magistrates, substitute judges, special justices, and administrative hearing officers.

EDUCATIONAL SERVICES

Major activities include:

- 1. Developing, organizing, conducting and participating in conferences, orientation programs, and other special in-state educational programs held annually.
- 2. Seeking grant funding and scholarship opportunities for judicial system employees' educational needs.
- 3. Developing education budget and tracking costs.
- 4. Administering the tuition reimbursement program for court system employees.
- 5. Administering online e-learning programs for court system employees.

Responsibilities:

- Develop short- and long-term curricula and identify educational needs of court system personnel.
- Coordinate annual conferences for judges, clerks, magistrates, and hearing officers through development of a comprehensive continuing education program: plan the contents of each conference; coordinate all arrangements for location, meals, travel, etc.; and complete follow-up activities after the conferences, such as reviewing attendee evaluations and sending follow-up materials to those participants who were unable to attend the event.
- Coordinate the two-week Pre-Bench Orientation Program and Judicial Mentoring Program for newly-elected judges.
- Monitor the Clerk/Magistrate Continuing Legal Education (CLE) programs.
- Update the Virginia Justices & Judges Photo Directory and the Virginia District Court Judges Photo Directory.

- Administer and develop regional training for substitute judges and monitor their compliance with continuing education policy requirements.
- Track judges' and substitute judges' compliance with the "Conflict of Interests Act."
- Provide training for special justices.
- Provide conference materials and videotaped training to retired judges and monitor compliance with continuing education policy requirements.
- Administer the Command Spanish Program for district court employees.
- Plan and complete special and ad hoc projects at the direction of the Executive Secretary.

The Department of Fiscal Services is the court system's financial management center for the Supreme Court, Court of Appeals, circuit court judges, general district and J&DR district courts, magistrates, the Judicial Inquiry and Review Commission, and the Virginia Criminal Sentencing Commission.

Responsibilities:

Budget:

- Develop and prepare the judicial system's Biennium Budget which includes the baseline budget and all budget amendments.
- Execute required budget transactions, monitor judicial system annual appropriations, analyze expenditures, and prepare monthly management summary reports.
- Prepare legislative financial impact statements during General Assembly Sessions.

Accounting:

- Reconcile courts' detailed financial records to the state's accounting system and maintain the integrity of the system.
- Maintain court/state-owned equipment, building inventories and insurance records.
- Prepare annual court system financial statements and issue other official reports such as for the Criminal Fund, Involuntary Mental Commitments, Education, Local and Commonwealth Revenue.
- Deposit all funds received.
- Process and maintain court facility leases.

Payroll:

- Prepare semi-monthly payrolls for the judicial system including salary and wage employees and substitute and retired/recalled judges.
- Reconcile and process health care and other miscellaneous employee deductions to appropriate agencies.
- Reconcile Virginia Retirement System and other employer contributions.

• Reconcile detailed payroll records to quarterly and annual tax information and issue required reports.

Purchasing:

- Issue purchase requisitions and orders covering the purchase of forms, equipment, supplies, etc., for the judicial system.
- Develop and prepare contract specifications, process bid requests to appropriate vendors, and review bids upon receipt.
- Order, receive, stock, and distribute court forms.

Accounts Payable:

- Audit and process for payment all vendor payment requests.
- Audit and process for payment all travel reimbursement and other types of requests.
- Submit payment requests to the Department of Accounts for payment.
- Prepare and mail IRS Form 1099 covering annual payments to vendors as required.

Grants

- Coordinate grant activities to ensure compliance with federal regulations and guidelines.
- Prepare required grant activity financial reports.

Programming/Computer Support:

- Develop and maintain effective fiscal-related operational programs.
- Coordinate with the Department of Judicial Information Technology to develop, maintain and update computer applications, systems and databases to service fiscal operations.

The mission of the **Human Resources Department** is to attract, develop and retain the most highly proficient workforce that supports the mission, vision and goals of Virginia's judicial system. We endeavor to address the diverse human resources needs of Virginia's judicial system through guidance, consultation and training.

1	Major	activities	include:	
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- 1. Maintaining a comprehensive Human Resources (HR) program for the Judicial system.
- 2. Administering the recruitment, selection and promotional process and procedures for all employees, except judges.
- 3. Administering the benefits program for all employees.
- 4. Assisting managers and supervisors with all employee relations' issues including termination of employees.
- 5. Administering the compensation and classification program including the wage budget.
- 6. Reviewing and revising the positions in the field, as needed, to ensure that employees are properly classified.
- 7. Administering the eLeave program.
- 8. Developing and providing training for HR-related topics.
- 9. Administering various employee award programs.
- 10. Administering the performance management program for all employees, except judges.

Responsibilities:

HUMAN

RESOURCES

- Assist with the development of ads for vacant positions and post all vacancies in the Judicial Branch Recruitment Register (JBRR) and the Recruitment Management System (RMS).
- Complete the New Hire process by reviewing all paperwork, conducting criminal background checks and records information from each new employee's Form I-9 (Employment Eligibility Verification) into the Federal E-Verify system to confirm identity and work authorization.
- Assist judges with the screening of applications and the development of interview questions for Clerk positions.
- Conduct New Clerk visits throughout the state to explain HR procedures.
- Assist with the coordination and training of the Judicial Management Program for new clerks several times per year.
- Develop and conduct HR-related training

throughout the Judicial system to support the training and development of employee skills to meet current and future needs of the organization.

- Administer the awards program for district courts and the magistrate system.
- Develop the parameters for the wage budget program and monitor the wage budgets throughout the year.
- Review and upgrade the classification and compensation of positions as requested/ needed.
- Provide the Virginia Employment Commission (VEC) with information about employees to determine whether or not they receive unemployment if terminated from employment. participate in unemployment hearings as needed.
- Update the Labor Laws poster as needed and distribute to all employees in the Judicial system.
- Process all benefits including, but not lim-

ited to, FMLA, Workers' Compensation, health insurance, disability, leave and retirement.

- Work closely with judges in explaining their retirement benefits.
- Provide information to outside companies/ agencies on employment verification.
- Track exit interview surveys of employees who resign from the Judicial system.
- Track employees' compliance with the mandatory Sexual Harassment training.
- Work closely with the Virginia Retirement System to ensure that they receive information on employees monthly.
- Administer the eLeave program for all employees and reconcile leave issues, including leave without pay, as needed.
- Assist the Department of Educational Services with the administration of the Knowledge Center courses (online courses) for all employees.
- Coordinate with the Department of Judicial Information Technology to develop, maintain and update computer applications and systems to service HR operations.
- Review and track all performance evaluations of employees.
- Work with all managers and supervisors in administering discipline and/or terminating employees.
- Maintain, revise and/or develop HR policies and procedures as needed.and consistently.
- Support the training and development of employee skills to meet current and future needs of the organization.

The Department of Judicial Information Technology (DJIT) develops, implements, maintains, and administers standardized uniform automated systems and all computer applications in support of the Virginia Judicial System.

JUDICIAL Information Technology

Major activities include:

- 1. Development, deployment, and maintenance of applications that support critical judicial functions.
- 2. Development, maintenance, and support of multiple local area networks and the judicial network.
- 3. Management and operation of the judicial data center located in Richmond.
- 4. Administration and support of mainframe processors, servers, desktop computers, laptop computers, and all associated software, databases,

operating systems, and peripherals.

- 5. Statewide installation, training, and support of video-conferencing equipment.
- 6. Maintenance and support of Virginia's Judicial System internet and intranet.
- 7. Development of information security policies and procedures.

Major information applications include:

- The Courts Automated Information Systems (CAIS), an online, integrated, standardized system that provides Case Management Systems (CMS) for circuit, general district, and juvenile & domestic relations district courts. This improves the courts' ability to manage basic operating functions such as indexing and docketing.
- 2. The CAIS also provides a complete Financial Management System (FMS) including a general ledger, accounts receivable, and statistical reporting systems. FMS also provides extensive reporting on collection of fines and costs, in support of both the Department of Taxation Debt Set-off program and the Collection Agency program.
- 3. Interfaces have been developed for internal systems as well as to other state agencies, such as DMV, Taxation, Department of Juvenile Justice, Department of Social Services, Division of Child Support Enforcement, and the Virginia State Police. The CAIS is installed in nearly all courts of the Commonwealth and

supports circuit, general district, and J&DR district courts.

- 4. The Records Indexing System (RIS), which meets all statutory index requirements of the Code of Virginia, allows indexing in the circuit courts of all land records and other permanent record items such as marriage licenses, wills, and financing statements. This indexing system is also interfaced with the Financial Management System (FMS) of the CAIS. A RIS compatible imaging capability (Records Management System-RMS) has also been developed to scan, store, and provide access to these records.
- 5. The Department developed and implemented case tracking systems for the Supreme Court (Supreme Court On-Line Administration and Reports-SCOLAR) and the Court of Appeals (Statistical Tracking and Reporting System-STARS).
- 6. A system for producing master jury lists for use by circuit courts and Jury Commissioners was created by merging the DMV drivers' license list and the Board of Elections voter registration

list to increase the number of possible jurors for a locality. This jury questionnaire support system is installed in a number of courts.

7. eMagistrate, a system that automates magistrate procedures across the Commonwealth and assists in criminal forms preparation was developed and installed statewide in 128 magistrate locations. The **Department of Judicial Planning** develops and maintains an effective planning capability within Virginia's judicial system. Working with judicial policy-making bodies (such as the Judicial Council of Virginia and the Committee on District Courts), the Department assists the Chief Justice and Supreme Court of Virginia in identifying present and future needs and developing and implementing innovative programs and solutions that address those needs. The Department is structurally divided between planning function staff and staff dedicated to specific programmatic or special projects.



Major activities include:

- 1. Maintaining a comprehensive strategic planning process for the judicial system.
- 2. Maintaining a futures research capability within the judiciary.
- 3. Carrying out consumer research and product development for the courts.
- 4. Conducting studies of substantive issues facing the courts as mandated for the office through the strategic planning process, by the Chief Justice, or by the General Assembly of Virginia.
- 5. Publishing statistical analyses and topical reports, such as the annual State of the Judiciary Report and Report of the Judicial Council, that serve to inform both governmental agencies and the public about the activities of the judiciary.
- 6. Developing special activities and projects on issues of statewide concern to the courts such as calendar management and delay reduction programs, domestic violence programs, and grants research and development.

Responsibilities:

- Direct the design and administration of a comprehensive planning process for the judiciary through which the future direction of the courts is established.
- Coordinate the internal management planning process of the OES through the development and execution of the planning cycle.
- Synchronize the planning efforts of the judiciary with those of court-related agencies at the federal, state, and local levels.
- Study issues related to judicial workload and prepare workload analysis reports and packages for certification of judicial vacancies and consideration of additional judgeship positions.
- Compile and analyze caseload and other data to provide effective court and docket management information and reports to Virginia's courts.

- Compile data and write issue papers on various issues relating to the implementation of new recommendations for the judiciary.
- Publish various newsletters to support the administrative, strategic planning, and management information activities of the OES.
- Represent the OES on inter-agency project teams related to planning initiatives and caseload statistical research such as the Department of Correction's Prisoner Population Forecasting Committee.
- Provide grants writing support to various OES departments and the courts on issues of interest to the judicial system and local communities.

JUDICIAL SERVICES

The **Department of Judicial Services** (DJS) serves as the liaison between the Judiciary's administrative offices and the courts throughout the Commonwealth, providing administrative services through publications, trainings, field visits, and the research and support of various programs. The Department serves the courts and magistrates of this Commonwealth through its seven divisions:

Circuit Court Services

Provides financial management, case management, jury management, technical assistance, and procedural training and support for circuit court judges and clerks and technical assistance

General District Court Services

Provides guidance, training, support and technical assistance to general district court judges and clerks on caseflow management, case processing, public relations, and internal financial controls

Juvenile and Domestic Relations District Court Services

Provides guidance, training, support and technical assistance to juvenile and domestic relations district court judges and clerks on caseflow management, case processing, public relations, and internal financial controls

Magistrate Services

Supervises magistrates and chief magistrates through eight magistrate regional supervisors. Six magistrate advisors are available around-the-clock to provide legal guidance to the magistrate system as well as assisting in providing educational services. The magistrate education coordinator is responsible for developing the educational blueprint for the magistrate system.

Foreign Language Services

Through certification, training and support, provides assistance to the judiciary so as to ensure that those with limited English proficiency have meaningful access to the judicial process

Dispute Resolution Services

Provides mediation and other dispute resolution alternatives through certification, training and technical assistance and assists courts in making parent education classes available

Drug Treatment Court Services

Provides administrative oversight and support for the four models of Virginia's drug treatment courts. Services include technical assistance, grant administration, training, budget management, monitoring evaluations for the effectiveness and efficiency of drug treatment courts in the Commonwealth. The **Legal Research Department** provides staff support and direct assistance to the Office of the Executive Secretary and the judiciary.

	Major activities include:
	1. Performing research for trial court judges.
LEGAL	2. Performing legal research projects at the direction of the Executive Secretary.
RESEARCH	3. Performing special projects and providing other staff members with direct assistance. For example, the Director, the Assistant Director and the Staff Attorney participate in educational conferences and training sessions.

Responsibilities:

- Perform legal research projects requested by the Executive Secretary, other staff members and judges. Primary categories of research include:
 - conducting legislative research to determine the effect on the judicial system of bills before the General Assembly,
 - drafting legislative proposals or amendments or the Executive Secretary and
 - upon request of a judge, researching points of law arising in cases in circuit and district courts.
- Serve as a direct resource for OES staff.

- Prepare and update various court operational manuals and advise regarding the update of similar office manuals.
- Develop and update district and circuit court forms.
- Legal Assistant provides organizational support for department and manages distribution of district and circuit court forms, various court operational manuals and similar office manuals.

The **Department of Legislative & Public Relations** manages legislative matters, and handles media and public relations for Virginia's Judicial System.

LEGISLATIVE & PUBLIC RELATIONS

Major activities include:

- 1. Developing the legislative package of the judiciary by working with the Chief Justice, the Executive Secretary, the Judicial Council, the Committee on District Courts, and the Judicial Conferences of Virginia.
- 2. Representing Virginia's Judicial System on legislative matters before the General Assembly.
- 3. Responding to inquiries from the press and the general public.
- 4. Coordinating the content of Virginia's Judicial System website to best meet the needs of the public and the courts.

Responsibilities:

- Coordinate the development of legislative proposals recommended by the Judicial Conferences of Virginia.
- Facilitate the development of positions on court-related legislation taken by the Judicial Conferences of Virginia.
- Provide information to legislators about the impact of legislative proposals on Virginia's Judicial System.
- Compile and maintain the contents of the court-related legislation page on the court's intranet website.
- Prepare and disseminate annual summary of court-related legislation.
- Prepare responses to requests for records and information.
- Serve as a liaison between the judiciary and

other branches of government.

- Supervise the maintenance and updating of existing content and approve the posting of new content for Virginia's Judicial System website.
- Review and update informational pamphlets about Virginia's Judicial System.
- Compose press releases for the court system.
- Perform special projects at the direction of the Executive Secretary and the Chief Justice of the Supreme Court.

Fiscal Review of the Judiciary

The General Assembly appropriated \$385.9 million for the judicial system for fiscal year 2012-2013. This constituted a increase of 3.3% from the \$373.5 million that was budgeted in fiscal year 2011-2012. These funds comprised just over one percent of the total state biennium budget.

Total judicial system expenditures in FY 2012 totaled \$376.1 million. Of the total judicial system expenditures, 68.3% or \$256.9 million was for operational costs: personal services (salaries, wage and fringe benefits) totaled \$222.7 million (or 86.8% of operational costs) and automation needs, services, supplies, and equipment totaled \$33.9 (or 13.2% of operational costs). Grant funds, Criminal Fund costs, and costs related to the involuntary mental commitment (IMC) process constituted the remainder (\$119.5 million) of total court system expenditures in fiscal year 2012.

Grant activity in FY 2012 totaled \$4.9 million. Details of all grant activity are found later in this section of the report while a more detailed summary of activities under the Criminal Fund and IMC Fund can be found in this section.

Utilization of Substitute and Retired Recalled Judges in the District Courts

In order to meet demands placed upon the courts when a vacancy exists on the bench, when a sitting judge is asked to fulfill certain administrative duties, or when a sitting judge must disqualify or recuse himself or herself in conflict cases, the district courts must call upon substitute judges and recall retired judges to assist in the processing of cases. During 2012, the total cost of the utilization of substitute and retired recalled judges in the district courts totaled \$1.7 million for a total of 8,800 days (36.2 full-time equivalency positions). In 2011, judges used 8,044 substitute and retired recalled judge days. The 8,800 days reported in 2012 equates to an average of 36.6 days per district court judge compared to 33.0 days per judge the year before. Between 2001 and 2004, there was a steady decline in the number of total substitute judge days utilized in the district courts. Since 2006, the number of total substitute judge days has been on the rise. See Table 58.

Judges in the general district courts utilized a total of 4,144 days or 47.1% of the total while judges in the J&DR district courts reported a total of 3,670 substitute days or 41.7%. The remaining days were utilized by judges in courts with "combined" clerks offices (986.5 days or 11.2% of the total).

Utilization of Retired Recalled Judges in the Circuit Courts

The circuit courts also face the need to recall retired judges from time to time to assist with the caseloads of the courts and provide adequate resources when judicial vacancies exist. In order to meet these demands placed upon the courts, the circuit courts during 2012 utilized retired judges for 4,177 days, an increase of 352 days or 9.2% from the number of utilized in 2011. This represented 15 full-time equivalent positions and an average of 26.6 days per circuit court judge. See Table 59.

<u>Innovative Advances Award:</u> Jeffrey A. Hesson Magistrate – Lynchburg, District 24, Region 3

As of July 1, 2012, magistrates are required to deny bail to an accused individual when a scenario listed in the Code of Virginia § 19.2-120 occurs during a bail hearing. Code § 19.2-120 involves some cumbersome analysis that contains numerous caveats and references to a host of other Code sections. Additionally, some of the presumptions to hold without bail listed in § 19.2-120 are rarely used, making their easy recall not possible. Mr. Hesson created an interactive, user friendly program using Microsoft Excel that identifies whether the Code of Virginia § 19.2-120, requires a magistrate to hold an accused without bail.

Magistrate Hesson spent several months during downtime in the office and time away from the office creating and perfecting the § 19.2-120 bail presumption program. Magistrates in District 24 and in District 11 did field testing to ensure the program was accurate. Such efforts to make a valuable and useful tool went far beyond the expectations of his job. His program was introduced to magistrates statewide during a conference and is being used throughout the Commonwealth. Magistrate Hesson was nominated by Magistrate Brenda Young because the program positively affects the quality of justice in Virginia by assisting the Magistrate in appropriate bail decisions that are required by Code. extra mile when dealing with those she comes in contact within the Judicial System. The Washington County's Magistrate Office has been focusing on increasing the professionalism of the magistrate, especially when dealing with citizens when conducting hearings. The hearing requires the magistrate to explain to the citizen whether he/she is attempting to get a process or if under arrest and what he/she can expect from the process. Magistrate Rouse developed an introductory paragraph that the chief shared with the district and is now being taught in Magistrate Certification School for new magistrates. She has inspired her fellow magistrates and leads by example. The Commonwealth is lucky to have Magistrate Rouse since she takes the time to do all she can for the citizens and law enforcement officers. even if the eventual answer is "no" because she does it graciously and professionally. Congratulations!

<u>Customer Service Award:</u> William "Bill" Klossner

CIRCUIT COURT

There are 121 locally-elected clerks serving in the circuit courts. The estimated 2012 population of Virginia according to the Weldon Cooper Center was 8,185,867, an increase of 2.3% from the 2010 population.

Review of 2012 Caseload

Caseload data for 2012 show that 284,951 cases were commenced in the circuit courts during the year, an increase of 0.5% or 1,303 cases from 2011 levels. This overall increase in new cases in the circuit courts was due to an increase of 3.6% in criminal cases. There was a decrease of 5.0% in civil cases.

The total number of cases concluded decreased 1.5% during the year, from 283,432 in 2011 to 279,084 in 2012. The number of juries impaneled fell 3.7% The circuit court judges averaged 12 jury trial days each during the year.

The judges of the circuit courts averaged 1,815 commenced cases each in 2012. In urban circuits judges averaged 1,577 cases each while in rural circuits the average was 2,127 cases per judge. The circuit courts averaged 1,778 concluded cases per judge (1,523 in urban circuits and 2,110 in rural circuits).

At the end of 2012, pending cases in the circuit courts totaled 264,698, a decrease of 1.5% below 2011 levels. The number of pending cases per judge stood at 1,686.

Civil Cases

In 2012, the number of commenced civil cases decreased 5.0% to total 99,084. Of these cases, 2.3% were general district appeals, 52.8% other law, 35.3 % divorce, 2.3% other equity and 7.2% appeals from the J&DR district courts. Of the 96,284 civil cases concluded in 2012, 27.3% were concluded prior to trial by settlement or voluntary dismissal. Bench trials accounted for 23.2% of concluded civil cases while 0.6% were concluded by a jury trial.

Approximately 74.8% of civil cases concluded reached termination within 12 months of filing. About 86.4% reached conclusion within two years while 3.0% actually took five years or longer. The Judicial Council's voluntary case processing time guidelines establish a goal of concluding 90% of civil cases within one year and 100% within two years.

Circuit court judges averaged 631 civil cases each in 2012; the average for judges in urban circuits was 662 civil cases per judge and in rural circuits 591 cases per judge.

Criminal Cases

The number of criminal cases filed in the circuit courts increased 3.6% in 2012 from 179,362 cases to 185,867. Of these cases, 68.1% were felonies. Of the 182,800 criminal cases concluded, 29.3% were disposed of by a judge trial while 1.1% reached conclusion by a trial by jury.

Approximately 41.9% of felony cases concluded in the circuit courts in 2012 reached termination within 120 days of initiation while 61.0% were disposed of within 180 days. Among misdemeanor cases, the circuit courts disposed of 45.8% within 60 days and 62.5% within 90 days. For criminal cases, the Judicial Council's guidelines call for 90% of all felonies to be concluded within 120 days of arrest, 98% within 180 days, and 100% within one year. For misdemeanor cases, the goal is to conclude 90% within 60 days and 100% within 90 days from the date of arrest.

The judges of the circuit courts averaged 1,148 criminal cases each in 2012 compared to the average for judges in urban circuits of 933 and the average for rural circuits of 1,428 cases per judge.

GENERAL DISTRICT COURT

Review of 2012 Caseload

Data for the general district courts of Virginia show that 3,087,041 new cases were filed in 2012, down 2.9% from the number reported the previous year. The number of new criminal cases increased 0.4% to total 404,575 with the number of new traffic cases falling 3.3% to total 1,871,374. Civil cases decreased 3.7% and totaled 811,092. The total number of hearings held in the general district courts fell 2.9% to total 3,396,712.

Among new criminal cases, misdemeanors decreased by 1.5% or 4,117 and totaled 261,657 cases; felony cases increased slightly (<0.1%) to 96,644. Among traffic cases, the number of infractions fell by 2.4% or 36,522 cases to 1,484,786. Traffic misdemeanors fell by 6.1% and totaled 353,350 while the number of capias/show causes issued in traffic matters decreased by 13.1% to 28,352. On the civil docket, civil actions (including warrants, detinues, and unlawful detainers) totaled 811,092. Total caseload in the general district courts was composed of 13.1% criminal, 60.6% traffic, and 26.3% civil cases.

In 2012, the 127 judges serving in Virginia's general district courts averaged 24,307 new cases and 26,746 hearings per judge. The average number of new cases per judge in urban districts was 26,621 compared to 26,894 in rural districts. Judges held 26,746 hearings each; with

J&DR DISTRICT COURT

Review of 2012 Caseload

Data for the juvenile and domestic relations (J&DR) district courts show 504,064 new cases were filed in 2012, up 0.6% from the number reported the previous year. The number of new juvenile cases increased 0.4% to total 256,966 with the number of new domestic relations cases increasing 0.9% to total 247,098. The total number of hearings held also rose 1.3% to total 1,173,840.

Among juvenile cases in 2012, traffic cases fell by 8.0% or 1,723 cases to 19,833; delinquencies decreased by 3.0% or 1,683 to 54,142; and status offenses increased 0.7% to reach 15,901. Custody/visitation matters increased by 2.6% or 4,289 and totaled 167,090. Among domestic relations or adult cases, misdemeanors increased 7.5% cases to 59,955 and felonies increased by 8.0% to total 16,065 cases.

Across the state, juvenile cases constituted 51.0% of the total caseload while adult cases constituted 49.0% of total filings. Custody/visitation matters represented 65.0% of juvenile cases. Among adult cases, 38.5% were civil support cases; adult felony cases comprised 6.5% of total new cases in the J&DR district courts in 2012.

In 2012, the 117 judges serving in the J&DR district courts averaged 4,308 new cases and 10,033 hearings per judge. The average for urban districts was 3,964 cases per judge and in rural districts the judges averaged 4,683 cases each. Judges overall in the J&DR courts held 10,033 hearings each compared to the average for urban
